# Treasurer's Report Shaun Herron

I am pleased to present the financial statements for the period of July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024. This fiscal year we had our financial statements reviewed and prepared by MNP with assistance from our bookkeeper, Goldene Mills. MNP was approved as a reviewer of the statements at the AGM last year.

CIPS Saskatchewan posted excess revenue for the year of \$24,533

Reasons main reason for the current performance include:

- 1. Interest from investments.
- 2. Reduced investment in webinars.

The organization currently has \$222,980 invested in interest bearing GICs.

CIPS Saskatchewan continues to maintain a healthy asset balance with \$236,456.00 in current assets.

Our provincial chapter continues to make significant strides for CIPS by leveraging alternative membership sources such as the international and immigration communities. Investments into new programs and delivery mechanisms will be a high priority this coming year to ensure we maintain our new international memberships. Increased cooperation with CIPS National will also be instrumental in how programs are delivered in the coming years.

Our investments in professional development and engagement was reduced in 2023-24 due to poor attendance in the previous year. Our plan for 2024-25 is to review the allocation of resources to virtual events and in-person programs to ensure that we build our presence and maintain our commitment to learning while minimizing risk.

I would like to thank our Board of Directors, Maria Galati, Executive Director and Goldene Mills our bookkeeper for their assistance this past year. I would also like to thank our outgoing President, Thomas Boxall for his contributions to the organization. The CIPS Saskatchewan Board of Director's dedication has been instrumental in ensuring our financial requirements have been met and the organization continues to thrive.

We have a strong Board of Directors that has been together for many years and that has proven instrumental to the stability of CIPS Saskatchewan. The commitment from the Board of Directors to invest in marketing and refreshed programs will help position CIPS within the competitive landscape of Information Technology professional development. As a Board, we encourage everyone to join the team and volunteer. It is through the efforts of you and others that will see CIPS Saskatchewan into the future.

Registrar's Report Beverley Gooding, I.S.P. (ret.)

Registrar's Report

from July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024

The Certified and Non-Certified members slightly decreased, Graduate 1, Graduate 2 and Candidate members remained fairly steady. Our Student members had an impressive increase.

During the last fiscal year the Certified and Non-Certified numbers had dropped but less than the previous fiscal year. Very little change occurred in the Graduate and Candidate membership types. The biggest gain was our student membership which boosted our overall total to a positive gain.

We continued to lose Certified members this past fiscal year but a smaller number than the previous fiscal year. However, in the previous fiscal year the Non-Certified membership increased but this past fiscal year a loss occurred.

The loss of certified and non-certified members needs to be investigated and addressed. As in the past years, foreign members have relinquished their designation due to diminishing opportunity for employment in Canada. We lost 68 certified members and 68 regular members. Hopefully this trend can be reversed in the coming fiscal year.

For about the first half of the year our membership hovered around 750. In January we had 97 students. In February we had an influx of 176 students which increased our membership from

748 to 927 members. By the end of the fiscal year we had 376 students which increased our total membership to 963 members.

Most of the Provincial bodies have gained members. CIPS Ontario made the biggest gained of 270 members. CIPS Alberta came in second with a gain of 51 members. The smaller Provincial bodies also made slight gains in membership.

The established discipline process follows the CIPS Saskatchewan Act and helps us govern our professional association within the province, ensuring our employers and business partners that CIPS Members and I.S.P. holders are held to the CIPS Code of Ethics and Professional Code of Conduct.

Within the last fiscal year, there were no complaints referred to the Discipline Committee from the Professional Conduct Committee, and thus no disciplinary action required. A review of the Discipline Process was conducted as part of an effort to keep the Discipline Committee current and capable to meet its obligations. No amendments or alterations were deemed necessary at this time.

Programs Committee, Mentorship Committee, and our new SharePoint site project. Volunteers are the lifeblood of any non-profit organization, and CIPS is no exception.

Greg Lane, the CEO of CIPS National, has pointed this out several times with his presentations on Canada's Digital Skills Supply Chain. ## 3.2. Treasurer's Report, Shaun Herron

I am pleased to present the financial statements for the period of July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023.

This fiscal year we had our financial statements reviewed and prepared by MNP with assistance from our bookkeeper, Goldene Mills. MNP was approved as a reviewer of the statements at the AGM last year.

CIPS Saskatchewan posted a loss for the year of \$5,936.00

Reasons main reason for the current performance include:

- 1. Reduced membership fees.
- 2. Webinar attendance was poor.

The amount of the loss was mitigated by a reduction in expenses and the increased focus on investments. The organization currently has \$225,000 invested in interest bearing GICs.

CIPS Saskatchewan continues to maintain a healthy asset balance with \$211,922.00 in current assets.

Our provincial chapter continues to make significant strides for CIPS by leveraging alternative membership sources such as the international and immigration communities. Investments into new programs and delivery mechanisms will be a high priority this coming year to ensure we maintain our new international memberships. Increased cooperation with CIPS National will also be instrumental in how programs are delivered in the coming years.

Our investments in professional development and engagement increased in 2022-23 and will continue to be a focus for CIPS Saskatchewan. Our plan for 2023-24 is to review

the allocation of resources to virtual events and programs to ensure that we build our presence and maintain our commitment to learning while minimizing risk.

I would like to thank our Board of Directors, Maria Galati, Executive Director and Goldene Mills our bookkeeper for their assistance this past year. I would also like to thank our President, Thomas Boxall, who leads our organization. The CIPS Saskatchewan Board of Director's dedication has been instrumental in ensuring our financial requirements have been met and the organization continues to thrive.

We have a strong Board of Directors that has been together for many years and that has proven instrumental to the stability of CIPS Saskatchewan. The commitment from the Board of Directors to invest in marketing and refreshed programs will help position CIPS within the competitive landscape of Information Technology professional development. As a Board, we encourage everyone to join the team and volunteer. It is through the efforts of you and others that will see CIPS Saskatchewan into the future.

John W motioned to accept the recommendation that we continue to use MNP Seconded by John S.

No opposition or abstentions.

Motion passed.

- Thomas outlined some other supporting reasons that this was warranted, which included that other CIPS sections (provinces/national) are using MNP.
- CIPS National retains MNP for their audit. Advantages include the fact that we get reviews afterward and receive recommendations.
- Audits locally (Provincially) have been discussed.

Janice asked about reports from other groups. A response was provided, and highlighted that most groups have provided reports, some may not be highlighted during the AGM due to the content (minimal) but are available to be reviewed if it is requested.

4 Recognition of all newly certified I.S.P.s

Registrar Beverley Gooding, FCIPS, I.S.P. (ret.) Registrar's Report July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023

Our membership numbers increased in every category except Certified in the past fiscal year, from July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023. The total membership declined by 11 members. The greatest decline was with the Certified members at 130 members. The other classes

in total increased by 119 members.

Breakdown of CIPS Saskatchewan membership from the July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023 (fiscal year).

This past year we made significant gains in membership in every category except Certified, which brought our total numbers down. The loss of certified members needs to be investigated and addressed. Many foreign members have relinquished their designation as it seemed there was little opportunity for employment if they were able to enter Canada. Hopefully the trend in the other categories will continue in the coming fiscal year. Our lowest number of members was in April 2023 when we had 653 members. However, by end of June we had 749 members.

Most of the Provincial bodies have gained members. CIPS Ontario made the biggest gained of 322 members. CIPS Alberta came in second with a gain of 51 members. The smaller Provincial bodies also made slight gains in membership.

Employers must also be made aware of the advantages of hiring an applicant that holds our certification(s).

Lola asked why the membership Fee for SK is higher than other provinces. Reason for the increase is to help manage expenses for programs and services.

Lola hinted or asked about possible fee reduction for renewals.

Finally, it was strongly recommended / we encourage people to reach out to the committees with suggestions and questions.

Janice express why she thinks there should be membership lists.

Janice motioned that there should be a list. There was a discussion on membership lists etc. A couple options were reviewed including the CIPS Directory

Thomas acknowledged Janice's input. John S commented on motion and weighed in with his input. It was noted there could also be Privacy issues, depending on how they were used.
